A FINAL MESSAGE FROM THE OUTGOING PRESIDENT

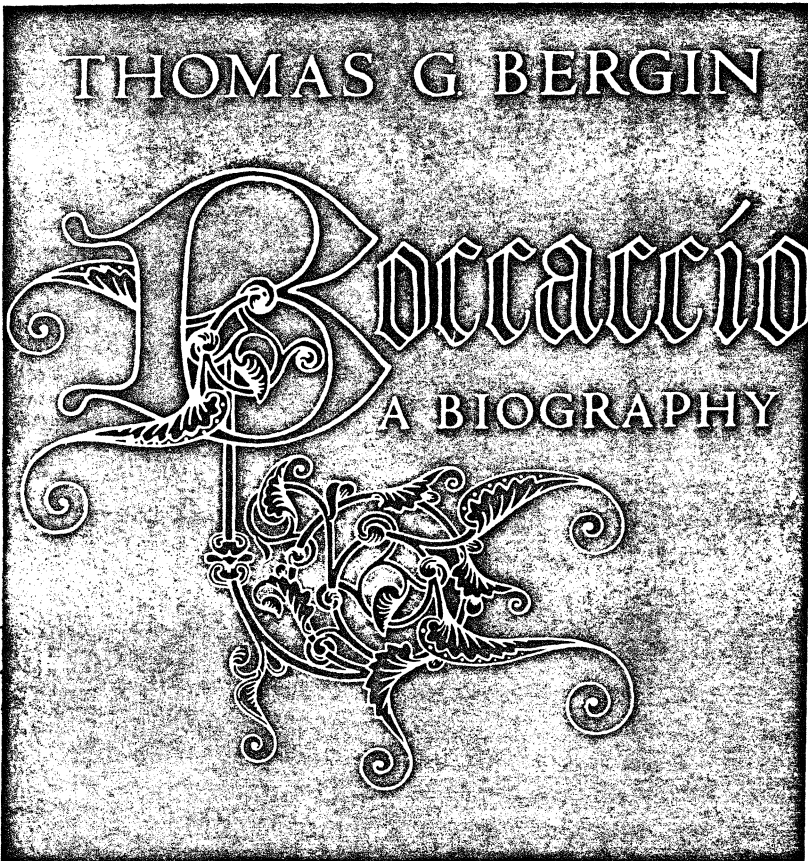

MINUTES

Minutes of the 1981 Meeting of the Executive Council of the American Boccaccio Association: The Executive Council of the American Boccaccio Association met on December 28 at 7:00 p.m. at the Sheraton Centre Hotel in New York.

Paolo Giordano, Secretary-Treasurer of the Association, gave the financial statement for 1981:

It was agreed that voting for the new president will be done by mail ballot. The ballot will be mailed to the membership with the spring edition of the Newsletter.

A slate of three candidates was presented to the committee:

1. Prof. Kristopher Kleinhenz, U. of Wisconsin, Madison
2. Prof. Giuseppe Mazzotta, Cornell U.
3. Prof. Elissa Weaver, U. of Chicago

Prof. Kleinhenz's nomination is tentative until he formally accepts the nomination. He will be notified.

The cash-bar was discussed and it was decided that the Association sponsor a reception instead of the cash-bar. The reception is less expensive than the cash-bar and at the same time fosters good will as it allows the Association to offer something special to its membership and guests.

MLA Meetings of the American Boccaccio Association: This year the ABA sponsored three sessions at the annual MLA convention held in New York. They were held in the Province room of the Sheraton Hotel on the afternoon of December 29th. At the beginning of the first session a brief business meeting was held and chaired by President Scaglione. Professor Scaglione announced the cancellation of the cash-bar and invited all who cared to come to a reception which would be held in his room at the Hilton following the three sessions. Professor Scaglione also urged those who had not yet done so to pay their dues. Professor Elissa Weaver announced that Professor Susan Noakes will chair the Boccaccio session at the 1982 meeting of the Midwest M.L.A. to be held in Cincinnati and that those interested in participating should contact her, c/o Dept. of French and Italian, Univ. of Kansas, Lawrence, KS 66045.
